2. Exhibits to be staged from 9.00-11.00 am on the day of the show. The hall will be cleared for judging at 11.00 am
3. Every exhibit must bear an exhibitors card, which should be obtained from a committee member on the morning of the show. Exhibitors to be responsible for the placing and checking of these cards.
4. **Entry Fee 30p per entry. Children's classes 20p.**

8. Anyone showing produce not grown in his or her own garden shall forfeit all prizes which may have been awarded at the show
9. Children can enter adult classes but the age of the exhibitor will not be displayed by the exhibits. In the children's sections, entries can only be in the appropriate age sections.
10. By arrangement with the Entries Coordinator, it may be possible for non-perishable entries to be left for exhibition prior to the show

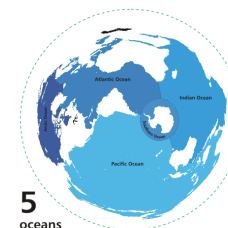

All exhibits to be made by the exhibitor. Cakes to be covered with cling film and displayed on a plain white plate. No doilies

Jars may be any size and should be filled to the top with plain labels having typed or printed capital lettering. Tops should be covered with cling film & sealed with an elastic band. No metal lids.

54. Chutney, one jar
55. Jam, one jar
56. Fruit Jelly, one jar
57. Curd of your choice, one jar.
58. Marmalade, one jar.
59. My Favourite Traybake, 5 slices
60. Boiled Fruit Cake (7-8in/18-20cm round tin)
61. Victoria Sandwich (7in/18cm round tin)
(6oz self raising flour, 6oz caster sugar, 6oz soft creaming margarine, 3 eggs, Jam filling, caster sugar for dredging). Cook 180C/Gas Mark 4 40-50 mins
62. Battenberg Cake (bought marzipan allowed)
63. Pizza with homemade base (12in/30cm)
64. Shortbread Round (diameter 6-8in/15-20cm)
65. Cake made using vegetable of your choice. Name vegetable used.
66. Swiss Roll
75g (3oz) caster sugar, 75g (3oz) plain flour, 3 eggs, approx 4 tablespoons jam, extra caster sugar for dusting. Temp: Electric 190C /200C . Gas No 6. Time 10 to 15 mins.
Line a 20 x 30 cms (8 x12 inch) Swiss roll tin with baking parchment. Whisk eggs and sugar until thick and holds a figure of 8 on top. Gently fold in the sieved flour with a metal spoon . Bake until springy. Place a damp tea towel on work surface and cover with a sheet of baking parchment. Dust with caster sugar. Warm the jam. Turn Swiss roll out on to baking parchment, peel off lining paper, trim the long sides, spread with jam, quickly roll up tightly. Dust with caster sugar.
